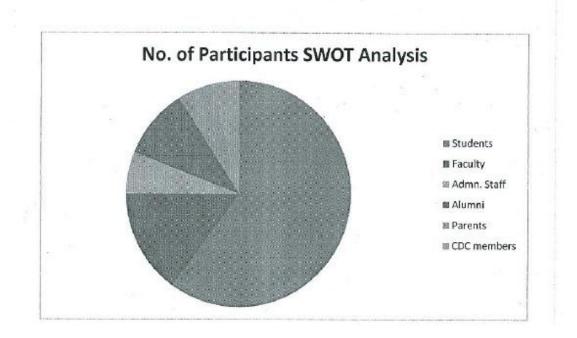

The college was established in 1982 and has slowly grown to its present stature, and commands its own identity in the area.

The college started with only commerce department but later other departments, i.e, Arts, Science and Business Management have been added.

Compared to other aided private colleges, our college has a very modest fee structure, which is one of the reasons for poor meritorious students to choose our college. Since, ours is a non-profit organization, the college strives to provide the best possible facilities, utilizing UGC funds and limited resources.

The institution is named after the great social reformer of the 12<sup>th</sup> century, Lord Basaveshwara and stands by his principles of equity. This is reflected in our demographic profile which shows a composition of over 23% SC/ST students, about 50% OBC students and a gender ratio of approximately 60:40 (M:F).

The cut-off marks for intake is a mere pass (35%) and many are low achievers. Despite this the hard work of the staff is reflected in the results which is above 70% consistently. High scores are encouraged by way of different endowment prizes in

different subjects. Further their photos are displayed in the college magazines. Also, our students have secured prizes in co-curricular activities at inter-collegiate competitions. The college also boasts of having been able to produce sports persons who have been in the Bangalore University team, consistently for the past 20 years.

The college has recently celebrated its silver Jubilee and enjoys the good will of the people around. The cordial atmosphere and committed staff attract a meritorious students from vernacular medium from places as far as Mandya and Tumkur.

The college has a vast expanse of land in the heart of the city and has a large play ground, adequate parking space and a well maintained garden. The classrooms are well ventilated and sufficiently furnished.

A spacious library with about 25,000 books and reprographic facilities is a strength of the our college. Well equipped laboratories and a big auditorium provide the necessary support for learning.

Using the latest technology in teaching forms a part of student centric teaching Class seminars, PPT presentations by staff and students has been adopted as a part of teaching.

The funds received from UGC are suitably utilized for growth and development of the institution. Transparency is maintained by way of regular audits the financial transactions fund utilization Certificate is sent to UGC within the stipulated time. The college was established in 1982 and has slowly grown to its present stature, and commands its own identity in the area.

ID Cards are mandatory for students. Anti- sexual harassment ragging cell is constituted and students are informed about the same Good discipline is maintained in the college.

### Weaknesses:

The management committee changes after every election. So, this change affects the continuity of policies.

The college is not focused on commercialization and so funds generated from students are nominal. This puts pressure on growth and modernization.

The state policy of ban on recruitment is adversely affecting the quality of teaching and the prospects for growth. Vacancies both in teaching and non-teaching have not been filled-up for the past 20 years. So, the college has to depend on temporary teachers on management pay. Naturally, the attrition rate is high as young post graduates look at teaching as a transient platform while scouting for better jobs. There is no continuity and with a lack of experienced teachers, quality suffers.

The low fee structure and cordial atmosphere attracts large number of students who are first generation learners. The feeding institutions are Kannada medium schools. Hence, majority of students are poor in English and lack social graces.

The large student-teacher ratio, the fixed curriculum, and problems mentioned above, provide limited opportunity for research, consultancy and collaborations.

As our is an affiliated institution, there is no scope for curricular design.

#### **Opportunities:**

The college scores in terms of antiquity and location. The college has large area which could be utilized to construct new buildings when funds are available. The growth in IT and ITES sector has opened up opportunities for post graduate Commerce and Science students and the college has the opportunity to capitalize on this.

The government's policies of increasing GER is a welcome move. In tune with this, the college may lay greater stress and provide opportunities for greater inclusivity. Many of our students hail from poor economic back-grounds and need to work part-time to sustain themselves. Starting of government aided vocational courses could provide opportunities to learn job-oriented skills that could augment their scholastic education. The financial burden of the students compels them to drop out of formal education. Measures need to be taken to arrest this. Conventional mind set of parents leads to early marriage of girls, which in turn leads to drop out. Creating greater awareness among both the parents and the students may result in reducing the dropout rate of girls.

New technologies and greater research has led to newer pedagogical methods. These need to be implemented in teaching by providing suitable teacher training and investing in new technologies.

The edu-sat programme is currently being utilized only by students of Government Colleges. If this is extended to private colleges as well, it could benefit larger number students and promote e-learning.

There is a dire need for faculty to upgrade their knowledge and skills. So, more FDPs need to be organized at regular intervals.

#### Threats:

A cursory survey of the neighborhood provided the information that there are over 20 colleges in a radius of 12-3 kms and so, the competition to attract students is very high.

The proliferation of private industries has created a demand for, trained graduates with competency in English. The arts graduates, particularly from vernacular medium are finding it very difficult to get jobs. So, number of admissions for B.A is dwindling everywhere.

The call centre culture, wherein young intermediates find openings, lure them away from formal higher education.

With government appointments not being made, talented youngster are not taking to teaching. So, availability of well qualified, motivated teachers is becoming difficult.

In the knowledge based era, good quality human resource is an important requirement for growth. But, majority of the experienced staff are either retired or retiring shortly. The government is not appointing the aided staff. Hence, the quality of education is declining.

More number of training programmes need to be arranged often as technology is undergoing lot of changes. Lack of funds available is a threat.

The bandwidth of internet is inadequate and so, collecting information from the internet or uploading information as become a tedious process. This is counter to the use of ICT in education.
